<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <input type="checkbox"/> Outlines vision for joint (e.g., district commitment to pursuing joint use in existing/new facilities) <input type="checkbox"/> Provides district directive for joint use that goes beyond the Civic Center Act (e.g., contains joint use language and provides district support for encouraging joint use practice) <input type="checkbox"/> Assigns management responsibilities for joint use at the district <input type="checkbox"/> May provide guidance for implementation of joint use including some or all of the following: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Appropriate partners ▪ An approval/denial process for use ▪ Essential components of a joint use agreement ▪ Fee schedule ▪ Prioritization of users ▪ Community engagement/wellness committee engagement ▪ Scheduling (e.g., district level of school) <input type="checkbox"/> Remains in place, even if joint use agreements end <input type="checkbox"/> Defines monitoring of use and users, evaluation, and reporting 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <input type="checkbox"/> Assigns roles and responsibility <input type="checkbox"/> Provides details for implementation <input type="checkbox"/> Contains <u>site-level details</u>, including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Designation of facility(ies) to be opened ▪ Scheduling ▪ Supervision ▪ Access hours ▪ Maintenance and repairs ▪ Security ▪ Length of agreement and process for renewal/amendments/termination ▪ Procedures for resolving conflicts ▪ Liability ▪ Risk management/insurance
